



Kākano Class







What is a Kākano Class?

Students who are starting school for the first time at Lynmore School will begin school in a kākano class. The teachers have been hand picked and are experienced in supporting New Entrant students to make the best start to Lynmore School. This is a class which will:

- Support children as they enter into formal school learning
- Recognise and plan for any children who need extra support early
- Transition children from Early Childhood Education centres into primary schooling
- Provide a quality foundation that enables students to effectively access learning.
- Welcome your entire whanau to Lynmore School and value your story (who you are and where you come from).



Why is a Kākano Class Important?

A kākano class will help children to develop the fundamental skills and attitudes required to become life long learners. In these classes, teachers work hard to embed positive attitudes towards school and learning, in addition to setting the expectations for children's behaviour and building sound understanding of key concepts such as literacy and numeracy. There is an expectation that your child will be in a kākano class for a minimum of 5 weeks. This enables them to develop relationships with the team around them, and learn the school structures, routines, expectations, and values.







How do we decide when a child is ready to move on?

In partnership with whanau, we will review each child's progress every 5 weeks and once they're ready, they will move to their new class. Whanau will be invited to have a Personalised Education Plan (P.E.P.) meeting with the child's kākano class teacher and their new teacher. Progress for children who are not quite ready to move on will be posted to Seesaw and whanau will meet with kākano class teachers during the school's PEP week.

Sharing your kete

When your child starts at Lynmore they already have so much in their kete that they are bringing with them from home and early learning experiences. The kete is a guide to help determine when students are settled and ready to move to their new class. Some students may not complete all items on the 'kete of knowledge' before being ready to move and kākano class teachers will consider each individual child on a case by case basis in consultation with whanau.
